THE OLD GIRLS' ASSOCIATION.

CONSTITUTION AND RULES.

The Society shall be called "The Old Girls' Association of the Oldham Hulme Grammar School for Girls."

The President shall be the acting Head Mistress of the School, and the Secretary shall be one of the members of the School Staff.

The affairs of the Association shall be conducted by a Committee consisting of the President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, and sixteen representative members, of whom one shall be elected by the Staff, fourteen shall be elected by the Old Girls, and one by the members of Form Upper VI. Of the fourteen Old Girls' representatives two shall retire annually in rotation, but they shall be eligible for re-election, and the election shall take place at the December meeting.

Members who, without good cause assigned, absent themselves from Committee meetings for two consecutive years, shall be considered to have resigned, and their places shall be filled up at the December meeting at the end of the second year during which they were absent from the meetings.

Full members (*i.e.*, girls who are able to attend the meetings) shall pay a yearly subscription of 2/6. Country members, who are not eligible to attend meetings, shall pay 1/6. Both subscriptions will include the "Record" and all notices of meetings.

All subscriptions are due in December, and may be paid at the meeting. No notices will be sent to any member whose subscription is two years in arrears.

There shall be two meetings of the Association each year—on the Tuesday preceding the School's annual entertainment which is a fixture for the first Wednesday in December, and on the first Thursday in July, with the exception that in alternate years a picnic on the first Saturday in July shall take the place of the summer meeting at School.

During the last week in November each member shall send to the Secretary at least one warm, useful garment for the poor. (Old clothes are also welcome.)

The "Record" shall be issued during the Spring Term, and shall be sent to all members who have paid their subscriptions.

“May Day 1895 was a great day for Oldham, for on that day the Hulme Grammar School began its work,” these were the opening words of our first Record. May Day 1920 is therefore the 25th anniversary of the opening of our School, and as it is the special province of the Old Girls’ Association to hold together all the links in the chain of the past, your Committee think that we cannot more fittingly celebrate this anniversary than by bringing together as many as possible of those who during the twenty-five years have worked for and in the School.

First in order come the Governors past and present to whose unflinching interest and public-spirited work the School owes an incalculable debt; then the mistresses who were never wont to spare themselves where the well-being of their girls was concerned, and last but not least, those thousand girls who have passed through the School and who cherish a warm regard for it, realising now what it stood for in their equipment for their part in life.

All these, then, the Committee hopes to welcome at a reunion at School, on Friday, July 2nd. Formal invitations will be sent out later, meanwhile we hope that all will make a careful note of the date, and not allow other engagements to interfere with it. Also if members hear of any Old Girls who in due course do not receive an invitation, will they please communicate at once with the Secretary and the omission shall be made good.

You all know that extensive additions are to be made to the Girls’ School, and we are sure that the Old Girls would resent it if they were not given an opportunity to do their share—to

contribute, say, a class room, or furnish a sixth form room, or the Kindergarten where their own little ones may take their first steps on the path of learning, such contribution to bear the name of the Old Girls' Association, a proof of what Old Girls have done, and an incentive to future generations to "carry on." A class room will cost at least £1000. A definite announcement as to how Old Girls may help will be made later.

Now as to the Roll of Honour, we have not forgotten it though Peace has been signed and our very temporary record still hangs on the wall because we have been waiting for the price of timber to come down. We want our Roll to be as complete as we can make it. Who are eligible? Any Old Girl, not necessarily a member of the Old Girls' Association, who undertook work simply to help her country in its time of need, and did so in the expectation and with the intention of relinquishing it as soon as the need for her service passed. Those who in search of a career chanced to step into war work are not eligible, though far be it from us to belittle the useful, nay indispensable work they did. The distinction is that they must have volunteered to take a man's place, nurse, work at munitions or on the land for the duration as compared with those who would have taken up similar work in any case as a means of livelihood. We shall be glad if members will look carefully through the list appended and send in any names that have been unwittingly left out adding particulars of service.

MEETINGS IN 1919.

On July 12th, we had quite an "old times" picnic. The place chosen was Alderley, and the special object of our excursion, a visit to the copper mine. Those members who were free in the morning met at London Road Station for the train leaving at 11 a.m., and on arriving at Alderley made their way to Hough Farm at the foot of the Edge and had lunch. Afterwards they dispersed to wander over the Edge, visit the Old Church, and pass the time till those arrived who could come only for the afternoon. All then went together to the mine. The following account is contributed by Helen Whittaker:—

When we arrived at the mine the guide was waiting with lamps and candles and we followed him down into what appeared to be a great sandy cave. All seemed pitch dark at first, but soon our eyes became used to the semi-darkness, and we could see that the rocks on either side were covered with green and blue stains of copper salts, making in many places lovely patches of colour. After stumbling on for some time we saw the light from another entrance, and how dazzling it was to our eyes now used to dim candle light! Now and again warning would come from the vanguard that heads must be ducked, or big stones in the path avoided.

On reaching the lowest part of the mine all gathered round the guide who explained to us that workings had been discontinued for some years on account of labour shortage, but a small fresh beginning was being made as there was plenty of copper ore as well as lead ore and some cobalt which were found as carbonates. Then we returned to the surface and were glad to find ourselves once more in daylight.

The works connected with the mine were visited next. First we saw the copper ore in blocks of limestone being ground up by a machine, then it was treated with sulphuric acid in great tanks, giving a blue liquid copper sulphate, this was afterwards seen in the form of large blue crystals on long strings. There is a greater demand for this compound, we were told, than for the metallic copper itself. We afterwards saw some copper sulphate being turned into copper by the addition of scrap iron, which formed an iron sulphate and left the metallic copper free.

After picking up a few specimens of the different things we had seen we left the mine and returned to the farm for tea.
